

OUTLINING YOUR DESCRIPTIVE NOVEL WORKSHEET



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What's One Way to Keep Your Readers Engaged?

That's easy... you make them feel as if they're a part of the story. For this to happen, each chapter must draw them in, play on their emotions, and allow them to see, feel, hear, and smell right along with the characters. The only way to do that is by being very descriptive and showing instead of telling.

Here's what I mean:

Example #1: The hot pot burned her fingers.

Example #2: As soon as her hand touched the pot she immediately snatched it away. She dashed to the sink, but the cold water was no match for her red blistering fingers.

Do you see the difference? In the first example, you knew the pot was hot because I **told** you. In the second example, you knew the pot was hot because I **showed** you.

Use the outline below to help you to stay on track and create a descriptive novel that will take your readers on an emotionally thrilling journey. Trust me, they'll love you!

Some things to remember:

- You may not use all five senses in every chapter, most likely you'll only use a couple.
- Don't describe something just to be descriptive. Make sure there's a reason you're telling us about this (Ex: You may describe the smell of something, but the smell reminds your character of something. It has to be meaningful, not just fluff.
- Your outline is a guide. You may or may not use everything you planned... It's okay.

Sean struggles to keep his composure.

Is the problem solved in this chapter? If so, how?

Jade spots Sean and sends for him to come outside before the situation gets out of control.

Additional information:

The familiar scent of Jade's vanilla body lotion caused a calmness to wrap around him.
